Dime Drive Rolls On In Local Area

Ottawa county campaign manager, and state vice-chairman, Dr. Bruce G. Carter, said in a statement made last Tuesday, "Infantile paralysis has been discovered over the state and county. The campaign in the county is now in full swing."

The fund raising campaign, which got under way on the first day of the year, will continue until January 31. Donations of time and money is strictly a free-will offer with workers receiving no pay whatsoever.

No quota has been set for the people in Ottawa county but \$7,000 was valued in last year's drive. Dr. Carter said, Half of the money raised will remain in the county with the other half being sent to the National Research Foundation. Ottawa county has been a victim of the epidemics in which the march of dime organization sent workers here to combat the disease.
