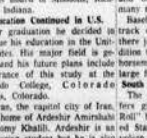

John Carter, the oldest in service of the three, has worked nearly ten years in his main job, caring for the Ad building and his supervisory student help.

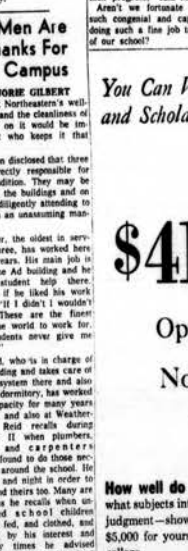
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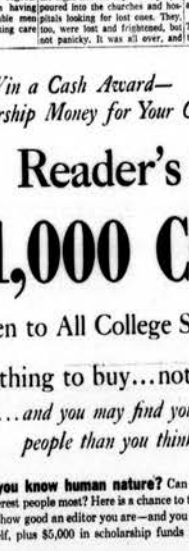
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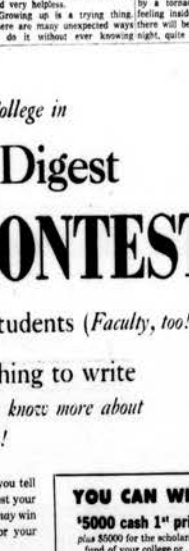
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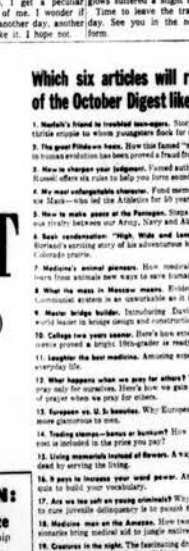
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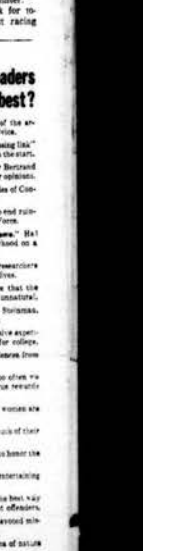
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# Aggies Gather Steam; Rest of Season Tough

Northwestern's Golden Northerns win over the Cameron Aggies from Lawton was an impressive one, true, but the fighting Northerns have the toughest part of their 1956 football schedule yet to complete.

Winning from the powerhouse Aggies does not mean that the Northerns will have a full measure of rest and recuperation after the game. The Northerns will be in the state championship, and they will have to play a game at the "Big Game" in California.

The remaining six games the Northerns have yet to complete are all going to be tough and very hard to win. Over-confidence can very easily spell defeat in any one of these games.

With this in mind, let us check the remaining Northerns schedules and try to analyze each of the six teams the Northerns meet.

First comes the Murray Aggies from Tishomingo, Miami trimmed Murray last year, 21-0. With this in mind, and the fact that the Northerns will be a "little down" from their victory over Cameron's week before, the game could be dangerous. Murray undoubtedly must be strong, for they are ranked in the Eastern part of the state.

The hardest contest the Golden Northerns face throughout the season will be waiting for them at San Angelo, Texas, the night of Saturday, Oct. 28. The Rams will field an experienced football squad, having won one first year man on the starting lineup. Last season 8-0-0 Anglo had a veteran line and a freshman backfield, and all of those backs "bounced" during the season. The Rams will be a "red-hot" first year in the Western division.

Northwestern's Aggies of Tonkawa will be Northwestern's sixth game of the year. Being also the "homecoming" for the Northerns, and the fact that Northerns handed them a 20-0 defeat at Tonkawa last season, the Northerns will really try to pour it on. The Aggies boast more than a "red-hot" line and a first year man on the starting lineup, including half back Doc Wilson. The clash will be played on a Saturday night, Oct. 27th.

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Northwestern could point to an 11-0 record in the regular season, but the head-to-head tiegame between the two teams and the fact that Cameron called their game late at the fourth period, but it was far too late. Northwestern had worn the hearts of the fans, 20-0.
