Northeastern A&M's traffic committee has announced that all violators who fail to pay car fines within 24 hours of the date issued on the ticket, will have to pay a double penalty.

Students receiving traffic tickets should pay fines in the finance office and if the fine is not paid immediately the double fine will be affixed to the student's transcript.

According to the traffic committee most of the fines are for students who drive inside the south entrance without the proper permit. Students must have special permits before entering the south entrance and parking near the union and the boys' dorm.

Another common infraction is failure of students to register their car. All cars parked near the campus must have a parking sticker and failure to register the vehicle will produce a \$5 fine.

### Busy Schedule Being Planned For '60 Event

Northeastern A&M college will welcome back the old grads in fine fashion Saturday as they roll out the red carpet with a busy schedule of gala events. Starting with a reception at 9 a.m. in the Carter student union, the day's program will be crammed with activities centered around returning alumni and former students.

"A Pretty Girl Is Like a Melody" will be the homecoming theme with each organization building a float centered around the idea of "pretty girls."

Following the reception, which will continue throughout the morning, a parade will be held at noon in the Carter student union. A large number of Norse lettermen are expected to return for the homecoming festivities.

Following the noon luncheon, the alumni will have a chance to visit old friends and tour the new buildings which have been added in recent years. Tours will be taken through the new Bruce G. Carter student union and Dyer Hall dormitory, both in their first full year of service.

At 4 p.m. a parade will be held through downtown Miami. The largest number of float entries in many years is expected to participate in the parade. A large number of bands have also been invited to take part in the annual parade.

Clubs who plan to build floats and their theme include: Press Club, "As Pretty As a Picture"; Home Economics Club, "My Blue Heaven"; Girls' Dorm, "Modern Mona Lisa"; Dyer Hall, "Over the Rainbow"; Aggie, "A Big Bouquet of Roses"; and Sophomore class, "Autumn Leaves."

Also, Industrial Technical Society, "Madame Butterfly"; Business Club, "The Girl of My Dreams"; ROTC, "Carrousel"; BSU, "The Spirit of BSU"; Engineers, "The Angels Sing"; Freshman class, "A Pretty Girl Is Like a Melody"; Pre-Med, "Circus of Stunts"; Masquers, "Oriental Rhapsody"; India Club, "The Pride of Oklahoma"; and the International Student Club, "Beauty is Universal."

The parade will start at 4 p.m. with floats assembling at East Third and South Main at 3:30 p.m. They will work their way northward to East Third and North Main, where they will turn East and descend to the college in preparation for final judging.

One of the highlights of the parade will be the queens reigning over their respective floats as they move through downtown Miami.

When Pearl Owens, sophomore from Weleotka, went into action in Northeastern A&M's Powder Puff Bowl the thought never entered her mind she might become famous with her picture being published all over the United States.

During the first quarter of action, Pearl tackled a freshman back, and in the process fractured her leg. She was taken to the Miami Baptist hospital and her leg was put in a cast.

The following day Orrick Sparlin, local photographer, took a picture of Pearl holding a football and, after appearing in the Miami News-Record, the photograph was sent out on the AP wire.

During the next few days the Norse Wind office received word from various sources that the picture had been run all over the country. The picture has appeared in Michigan, Texas, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York, Iowa, and in all probability in every state in the country.

Last week Pearl received a clipping of her picture along with a letter. An interested male wanted Pearl to sign the clipping and send it back as the student wanted to put it on a bulletin board in his dorm.

When asked about the sudden turn of events Miss Owens stated it was wonderful—that is the publicity and the many gifts received was wonderful—not the fractured leg.

In a contest of thrills and spills the Northeastern A&M sophomore Amazons won a 24-14 contest from the freshmen Hercullies in the second Powder Puff bowl held recently before a large crowd on Robertson Field.

The girls played the contest in regular football helmets, jerseys and pants, and each team went all out to win the contest for their respective class.

The Amazons showed they meant business when they scored on the first play from scrimmage on a quick snap from an unexpected position. The ball was given to Joyce Livengood, sophomore quarterback from Manchester, and the agile back sprinted 63 yards for the opening score.

It didn't take the freshmen long to even up the score as scabbard Judy Eaton, Nowata, did some outstanding running and went on to score making it 6-6.

Eaton was not through, however, as the shifty halfback scored again and then ran for the extra points to make the score read 14-6 in favor of the freshmen Hercullies.

However the freshmen lead was cut quickly as Livengood reduced the margin to 14-12 with a 26-yard touchdown jaunt. The score remained 14-12 at halftime with the freshmen holding a slim two point margin.

The Amazons went ahead in the second half on another Livengood touchdown and she finished the scoring a few minutes later on a 40-yard scoring dash.

Only injury in the contest occurred in the first quarter when sophomore Pearl Owen received a fracture while making a tackle. A related story can be found on this page concerning Miss Owen.

Highlighting the contest were colorful halftime activities including the crowning of the Powder Puff King and the Band King. Norse football squadmen, dressed as Norse Stars along with the NEO band, and male cheerleaders, twirlers, and sweethearts, added color to the crowning of the kings.

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# Northern Here for Homecoming; Norsemen Down Murray, Wichita

## Norse Defense In Top Form Against Foes

Northeastern A&M's Golden Norsemen took a giant stride toward the Oklahoma Junior College championship and another outstanding season with a 34-0 conference victory over Murray and a 7-4 victory over the Wichita freshmen.

The Norse jumped into a 20-0 halftime lead against Murray two weeks ago and then coasted to their second conference win without a defeat. In the Wichita contest the Norse scored in the opening quarter and held Wichita from getting closer than the Northeastern 47-yard line.

By shutting out the Wichita squad the Norse have now gone two straight contests without the opposition being able to cross the goal. It has also allowed the Norse to run their season record to five wins against a single defeat.

In the Wichita contest, played last Saturday night, the NEO squad scored when fullback Bill Carlyn blasted up the middle for eight yards and the touchdown. The score came with 2:44 left in the first quarter and quarterback Gene Hart kicked the extra point to provide the Norse with the victory.

The Norsemen came within a foot of another score in the final period as halfback Paul Payne picked up 28 yards on a 37-yard drive that followed the recovery of a Wichita fumble by linebacker John Estes. The drive ended however when Payne fumbled the ball as he attempted to cross the goal.

Highlighting the contest was the strong defensive play of the whole Norse team. Estes, Larry Bohannon, Ronnie Ellis and Dave Malloy kept the middle well bottled up while the Norse defensive secondary kept the Wichita club to only three pass completions for a total of 25 yards.

The Norse took advantage of a short Wichita punt to set up their lone tally. A nine-yard boot gave the NEO club the ball on the Wichita 32-yard line and it took only two plays for the score. A 24-yard pass from Hart to end Donne Pittman set up Carlyn's eight yard blast.

In the conference tilt with Murray two weeks ago the Norse never gave the Aggies a chance as quarterback Gene Hart hit halfback Bob Bruno on a pass play that covered 76 yards and the first touchdown. Hart then added the extra point and the Norse held an early 7-4 lead.

Murray had a chance to score when the Norse fumbled but failed when they missed a field goal. The Norse came back to score after blocking a Murray punt. They scored midway in the second period when fullback Bill Carlyn plunged over from the one-yard line after putting the ball in scoring position on a 17-yard run. Hart missed the try for extra point and the Norse led 13-0.

The Norse blocked another

Murray punt a short time later to set up the third Norse touchdown. It took little time for the score as Hart passed to halfback Paul Payne for the touchdown and then kicked the extra point for the 20-0 halftime lead.

After intermission the Norse took advantage of another Murray mistake as guard Paul Ducoy recovered an Aggie fumble to set up the only score of the third period. The Norse took over on the Murray 18 and with Carlyn lugging the ball on four occasions scored when the hard hitting fullback recovered an Aggie fumble to line. Hart converted to make the score 27-0.

The Norse ended scoring when Payne scored in the fourth quarter for his second tally of the night. He scored on a seven yard pass from Hart. The Norse quar-

terback then booted the extra point for the 34-0 victory.

The Norse ran up 14 first downs against seven for the Aggies while outrushing the Murray squad 190 to 67. The Norse netted 228 yards from scrimmage while holding the Murray team to 112 yards.

Hart was the big gun for the Norse along with the running of fullback Bill Carlyn. Hart's passing arm was accurate as he hit both ends and his halfbacks consistently for long gains. This, combined with Carlyn's brilliant running, gave the Norse a well balanced attack.

## Norsemen Need Victory In Homecoming Contest

When Red Robertson's Golden Norsemen take the field Saturday night for their homecoming clash with the Northern Mavericks, they will be trying to uphold one of the finest records ever compiled by a modern grid team in the past fifteen years.

After besting the Haskell Indians, 27-0, in 1946, the Norse have lost only one homecoming contest, and that by a score of 18-13 to the Cameron Aggies. In these homecoming games the Miami squad has only twice been held to less than 20 points, while allowing their opponents to score three times only on three occasions.

Northern, opponent for Saturday's homecoming clash, has appeared before the Northeastern A&M Alumni four times since 1946, and has yet to travel back to Tonkawa with a victory. In fact the total scores for the four games finds NEO holding a 158-27 point edge. This is not such a bad record, however, when you find the accumulative total for all homecoming games since 1946 a whopping Golden Norse margin of 448-100.

However the contest this year promises to be a close one as each team has only one defeat and both are still undefeated in conference action. With the personnel and coaching which has carried the Mavericks to surprising upsets over such outstanding teams as Murray and

Coffeyville, Saturday's episode should be a thrilling contest in which one team should emerge with an inside track for the Oklahoma Jucos crown.

The homecoming contest is a "big" one for both clubs as a convincing win this week by either club might give the winner a shot at post-season play. A loss, on the other hand, would definitely eliminate any post-season play along with ruining the chance for an Oklahoma conference championship.

If the contest holds up to expectations the NEO alumni should see a real thriller on Robertson Field Saturday night with the winner in the driver's seat for an outstanding year.

Following the contest with Northerners the Norse will host Connors Aggies on Robertson field Friday, October 28 in their last conference game at home.

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
