# Murray Times House 29-21 For League Upset of Year

## Aggies Score Early; Inman, Lollis Star

The Murray Aggies, playing like a championship team, ambushed Northeastern's Golden Norsemen and handed them a 29-21 loss at Tishomingo, Thursday, Oct. 11. The defeat was the first of the season for the mighty Norsemen of Miami, against three impressive conquests.

Murray converted an early Northeastern fumble in the first period of play into the opening touchdown, and continued to "pound" Miami throughout the first half of play. Shooting a very impressive passing game against the Norsemen, Murray gained possession on their own 45-yard stripe, and marched 15 yards on runs by Richard Brundage, quarterback; Morse halfback, and Bob Curright, aggressive field general for the Norse. Ted Eames, quarterback; Morse halfback, won chorused for three more yards and Miami was leaving.

Norsemen fullback Duke Bill Roth, then dashed the Tishomingo fans with a 30 yard scamper for a touchdown. Frank Marlowe converted the first of three NEKO extra point attempts.

Murray's Aggie didn't even seem to notice the Northeastern attack though, as the next 12 seconds they gained possession of the pigskin they scored. The drive against the NEKO club was the highest yardage in just five plays. Aggie quarterback Inman tossed a 45-yard pass to Lollis, and played later Murray halfback Stewart, bulled over from the yard marker. Underwood again converted and Murray was pulling away.

The Aggies scored once again in the third quarter as Inman and Lollis combined with a 30-yard pass and a touchdown. That finished the Aggie scoring for the night.
