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Opening but Have Ten Pitchers Return

Leading the parade of pitchers and catchers that turned out for the first workout Monday in preparation of the opening of baseball season, were four pitchers and two catchers returning from last year's Juso conference champions.

The returning pitchers are Leroy Scoles, John Barlow, Earl Boyer and Howard Wagner. Scoles was the ace of the mound staff last year and appeared in nine of the ten games played by the Norse baseballers. Scoles record for the season was five wins and two losses.

Of the three other returning pitchers, only Wagner drew a starting assignment, that against the Common Aggies in which the Norsemen bucked away a 1-6 victory. Thus Wagner's record was 1-6 Barlow and Boyer were front line relievers last year and did not compile a win-loss record.

Two Catchers Back
The two catchers returning are Jerome Haney and Glenn Plumb. Haney was the No. 1 catcher last year and Plumb No. 2. However, these two are not the only ones who will be fighting it out for position. Ted Suppe, of the '48 team is back this year after a hitch in the service, where he participated for the 4th division team. Suppe is expected to kick up quite a bit of competition in the catching capacity. Another prospect is Bruce Clark.

When the infielders and outfielders turned out for practice there were four lettermen in the crowd. They were Virgil Mayab, Bill Frank, Bill Scantlen and Bob Roth.

One Infielder Returns
Mayab is the only returning member of the solid infield of the Norse baseball club last season. Virgil played at the shortstop position and was an exceptional play man and had a hitting average of .300 in the 290's.

Scantlen was one of the best defensive players on the squad last year and pulled down several long drives scored for extra bases.
