The first is a book about a day's place and a murder—and about a study of men and women. For The Day Lincoln Was Shot is the story of the tragedy of Lincoln's assassination, written in unusual form by Jim Bishop, its author. Bishop, a well-known reporter, is said to have done research for 50 years before he organized his findings into this book.

To insure authenticity, Bishop read the works of and enlisted the aid of such Lincoln scholars as Bruce Barton, Stefan Lorant and Carl Sandburg.

The chapters in The Day Lincoln Was Shot start with one for 7 a. m. April 15, 1865, the tragic dawn following the attack on Lincoln's life. Into these chapters are written the characteristics, the motivations, the incidents, the promulgations, the facts about which Bishop uses to write a readable and interesting book.

Karen is the story of another tragedy, which, through love and understanding becomes a triumph. It is a contemporary American novel written by her mother, Marie Killilea. This is a true story about a little girl who, though slightly above average mentally, is handicapped in other ways. Her mother tells about Karen's place in their family life, those who help her find that place and about the origin and growth of what is now a street, national organization, the United Cerebral Palsy Association, which Mrs. Killilea founded. A mother's true story of how she fought to give her little girl life—after birth—Karen is written with taste and understanding.
