Mayes County, Vinita Cop Honors Aggie Day

Mayes county copped honors in the 4-B division and Vinita's chapter took first in the FFA division in the fifth annual Northeastern A. & M. Aggie day held on the campus April 17.

The register list showed that 597 students attended the annual event, according to Harry Syner, agriculture head at Northeastern A. & M. These students represented schools and counties throughout the four-state area.

The contests were carried out through the day and in the evening, a church wagon dinner was served, after which the awards were presented by the Northeastern Agriculture department. Also presented at this time was a beautiful belt buckle

to the outstanding junior college agriculture student, Gayle Brock. The buckle was donated by Dr. L. C. Smith.

Entertainment for the group was a presentation by the high stepping Norse share of the college and teacher by Mary Ruth Ross, livestock division.

In the livestock division Mayes county copped the first place honors with 1,260 points and the high individual was Dick Pepin. Second place went to Craig county with 1,118 points and Osage county scored 1,080 for third place.

Osage county came up with the honors in the field crop division with 2,013 points and Billy Fetter was the high individual. Craig county took second and Delaware county third.

Poultry judging went to Craig county, Mayes county and Rogers county in that order with Percy Weaver taking high individual.

Mayes county won the dairy contest and was followed by Jasper county, Mo., and Ottawa county respectively. Bill Mitchell took the honors in this division. All of these were in the 4-B division.

In the FFA division Vinita won first in the livestock division and Dreyer, second and Mansford, third. Dix Jelo was high individual in the livestock judging.

Rubell took the field crop division and was followed by Cheateau and Afton. Two Lagras was the high individual in this contest.

Poultry honors went to Donnie and Cheateau took second. Third place went to Vinita in this contest. High individual was Gene Allen.

Vinita nailed down the top place first in the dairy division with Colwellville and Cheateau falling behind in this ongoing event. Duke Neal was high in this contest.
