

China Puzzle

Over a year-and-a-half ago, William C. Bullitt, the former U. S. ambassador to Russia, presented to the American people his views on the Communist puzzle in China. His analysis of the situation was printed in nationally-known magazines and he also presented his views in a radio forum.

Bullitt said, "To prevent the domination of China by any nation which might eventually mobilize the 450 million Chinese for war against us is a vital interest of the United States. Retired President Chiang Kai-shek had retired to Amoy. China was again at war. This time, in the most disastrous type of war—civil strife.

Bullitt hit the nail on the head. Communist domination of China was in the making, slowly, inevitably coming to the present crisis stage. Bullitt referred particularly to the "hands of Stalin." Indirectly, the hands of Stalin are working now in China. The force of Communism upon the defeated Chinese warlords has been a new cause in the world was over-powering. An unmillitary nation, China, perhaps, has felt the need to engage in sporadic wars merely as part of her training in growing up to the standards of soldiers, government employees, and general graft in the government. Bullitt suggested the only possible alleviation of the situation to be the finishing of the war.

Communist subjugation of weak nations, such as China, Rumania, and the other Red satellites in the Eastern Hemisphere is frightening the world. "If China," said Bullitt, "falls into the hands of Stalin, all Asia, including Japan, sooner or later will fall into his hands. The manpower and resources of Asia will be mobilized against us. The independence of the U. S. will not live a generation longer than the independence of China."

His last statement is an amazing one. A generation is not very long. It will include our children. Bullitt suggested financial aid and armament aid for the Nationalist Chinese. Such help did not come through. China has fended off the Communist problem long enough—the fight's end will be the determining pattern of China. However, in American eyes, it is not worth fighting for.
