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The Golden Norsemen of Northeastern Oklahoma A & M, starting their schedule at Boone 20 to 0, opening practice on the 18th, found that their performance was quite up to par with the weather. Debatively their "batting average" was rather good, but offensively their score was only below average until now. Life was injected into the squad by the inspired leadership of the second offensive group, which included ten freshmen and one sophomore; the latter was also a newcomer to college football, as he did not participate last year.

Mike Russell, who seems to be slated as the Norseman with the "Toe," kicked off to the Boone Indians to open the second half. The rugged Norseman line created a solid wall which the Indians failed to penetrate, and the Norsemen took over on downs.
