## Fall Semester Enrollment Increases

Fall enrollment at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College has reached an all time high. A total of 2,862 students are attending classes compared to 2,786 at this time last year, for an increase of 76 students.

There are currently 1,504 males enrolled, 70 more than in 1979, and 1,358 females, up six from last fall. Freshman outnumber sophomores 1,828 to 601 and there are 192 more freshmen than in 1979. The sophomore

class is down from 710 last year to 601. Special students, those not working toward a degree, total 433 compared to 440 in 1979.

Students enrolling in college for the first time number 1,184 which is up over last year's 1,164. Oklahoma residents total 2,507 of the present enrollment, with 241 students attending from 22 other states. One hundred and fourteen students are from foreign countries.



## Judging Teams Take Honors

Northeastern A&M Livestock judges brought home two second place trophies from recent competition in Kansas City and Louisville.

In Kansas City at the American Royal, Monty Layton, Adair sophomore, paced the NEO effort by placing fourth high individual.

Blackhawk East Illinois scored 4,343 to win the team title. NEO tied for second with Colby, Kansas, and

Hawkeye, Iowa with 4,306.

Blackhawk also outpointed NEO for top honors at the North American Livestock Exposition in Louisville. The Illinois school totaled 3,849 points to 3,831 for coach Jarold Callahan's NEO squad.

Callahan's team won the reasons competition and placed third and fifth, respectively, in cattle and sheep judging.



## Football

### NEO Captures National Title

Capping off a season that proved to be successful, the Northeastern A&M Golden Norse football team captured its sixth National Junior College Athletic Association national championship in the Fourth Annual Garland Chamber of Commerce Bowl in Garland, Texas, by defeating the Rangers of Kilgore (Texas) Junior College 21-14.

The Norse, under third year head coach Glen Wolfe, completed the season with a perfect 10-0 record. The previous undefeated mark was in 1969 when NEO finished 10-0 and claimed the NJCAA national crown.

Relying on a consistent ground game throughout the 1980 season, the Norse were shut down and forced to put the ball in the air. Freshman quarterback Tod Weder finished the afternoon hitting 10 of 16 passes for 219 yards and one touchdown. On the

receiving end of a majority of the Weder passes was freshman wide receiver Duane Gunn. In the game Gunn had seven receptions for 165 yards and one touchdown for 53 yards.

Going into the championship contest ranked in the top spot of the NJCAA poll, Kilgore jumped out to an early 14-0 lead on their first two possessions of the game on long sustained drives.

In the number two position prior to the conflict, NEO slowly began to fight back. The Norse cut the deficit to seven points when Weder found Gunn for a 53 yard scoring strike. After making the reception, the fleet-footed receiver cut back across the field and eluded several tacklers for the score. Sophomore Doug Furnas added the extra point kick to make the score 14-7 with 5:24 left in the first half

NEO tied the score with 41 seconds left in the half on a six-yard scamper up the middle by Weder. Furnas toed the extra point to make the score 14-14 at halftime.

The final Golden Norse touchdown came at the 6:59 mark of the third quarter when sophomore tailback Mike Cowart took off on a seven-yard jaunt around the end, and with the Furnas PAT kick, the Norse held a 21-14 advantage.

Kilgore threatened late in the game be driving down to the NEO six-yard line before freshman linebacker Kelly Goode sacked the Ranger quarterback as the final seconds ran out of the game.

For his performance, Duane Gunn was selected as the Offensive Most Valuable Player of the game.



## Over 500 Parents' Day At NEO High Success

Over 500 parents had the opportunity to visit students and tour campus facilities during the September 27, Parent's Day at Northeastern A&M College.

An important victory of the NEO Golden Norseman over the Independence, Kansas Junior College highlighted the day.

"We feel this is one of the finest activities that we have and we want to invite parents to take part in the festivities. This is an excellent opportunity for parents to see how the students live and get a picture of campus life," explained Ken Wilson, NEO counselor and coordinator of the year's Parents' Day.

Activities began at 10 a.m. with registration in the faculty lounge of the student union. Also starting at 10 was an audio visual presentation in the faculty lounge of the student union and

open house in the dormitories and other college buildings. Parents were invited to tour those facilities.

After lunch in the cafeteria a general meeting was held in the student union ballroom. At 3 p.m. a drama

program was presented in the Fine Arts Theatre.

Kickoff of the game was at 7:30 and parents were recognized at half-time with those traveling the longest distance being honored.



## 1980 NEO Homecoming

Alumni returning to Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College were treated to a banquet, a parade and a traditional football game October 18, as the school held its annual homecoming.

This year's homecoming theme was "The Wild, Wild West," submitted by Patti Beth Roberts. The theme was selected by a panel of student and faculty judges as part of the Student Senate sponsored theme contest.

The annual golf tournament started off the day at the Miami Country Club.

The Baptist Student Union sponsored an alumni brunch in the BSU center, while an open house was planned at the home of NEO President

Dr. D.D. Creech.

Registration was held in the lobby area of the Student Union where football tickets were made available.

The annual homecoming parade started at 3:30 with the route set through downtown Miami. After the parade, dorms and campus buildings were open for visitation.

At 5 p.m. a banquet was held at the Student Union, where the annual Alumni Association meeting was held. Alumni Association officers were elected and the outstanding alumnus of 1980 was announced.

## Religious Emphasis

Days of religious sharing, discussion and music began as Northeastern A&M College held its annual Religious Emphasis Week.

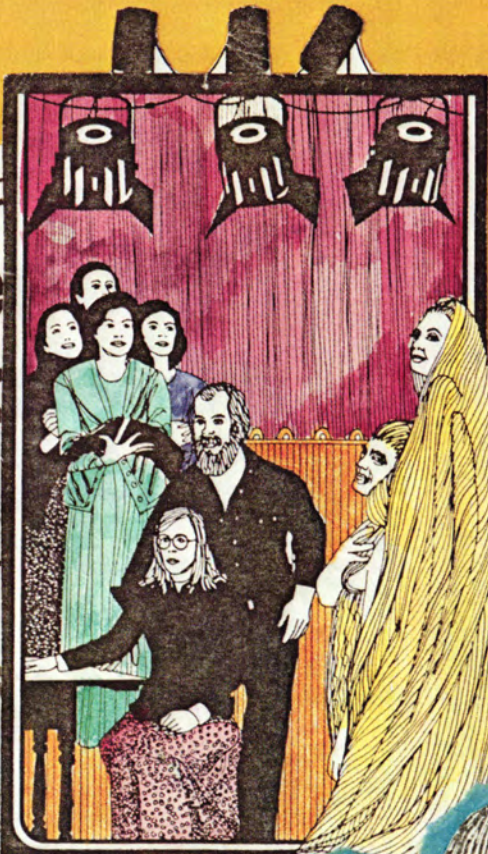

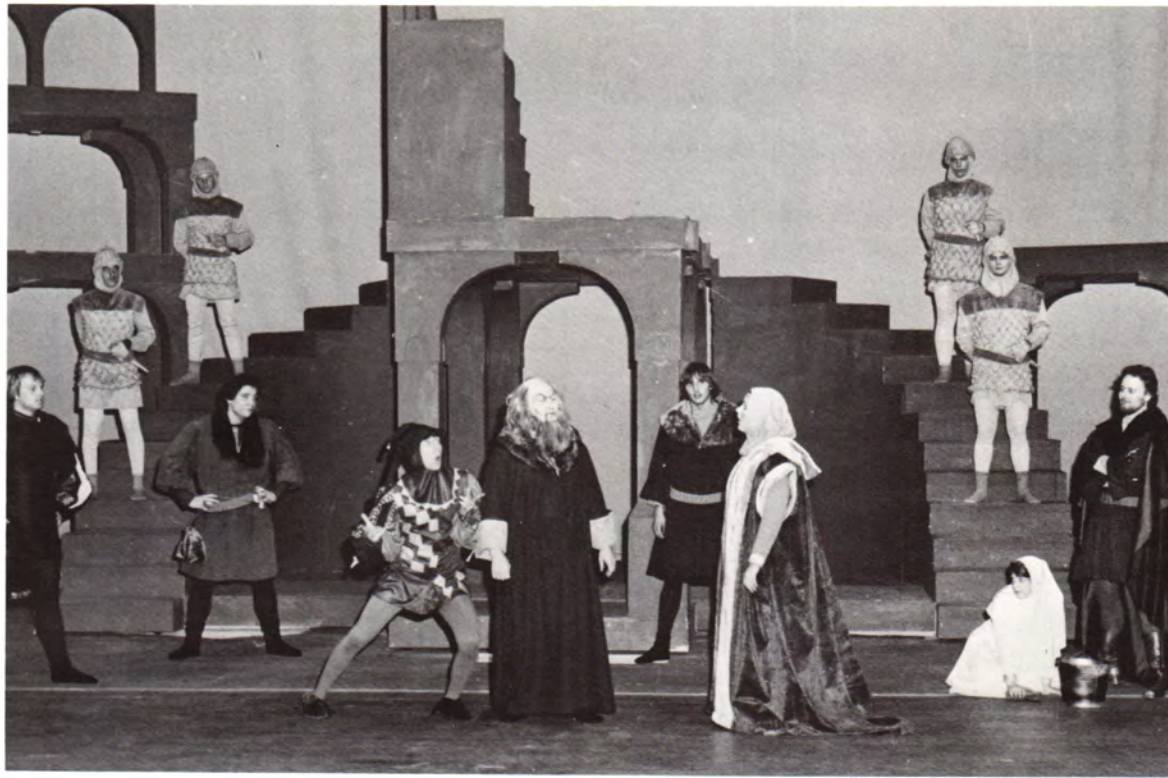
The time has come for Edmund, David Payne, to choose between the two daughters, Patti Beth Roberts, and Angela Ford.

"Lear" is a double story of the heartbreak found in the generation gap. It also addresses the common tragedy of decline, old age, senility and death. Edmond, the bastard son of Gloucester, betrays his father and half brother because he resents the unfairness of his father's treatment. Goneril and Regan, Lear's two oldest daughters, hate their younger sister Cordelia and they gloat when she falls into disfavor and banishment.

Misplaced trust creates tragedy. Lear banishes Cordelia who really loves him because she won't play the "I love you" game like her older sisters. He then gives all he has to the lying older sisters because they say they love him. Only after he lives with them does he learn the truth about the resentment his daughters harbor towards him. Gloucester does the same foolish thing when he believes the lies of Edmond about the innocent Edgar. King Lear offers some problems for the modern day audience. Shakespeare's theatre employed several conventions which are foreign to us today. For example, Edgar, when he finds himself a fugitive, disguises himself as a mad beggar. 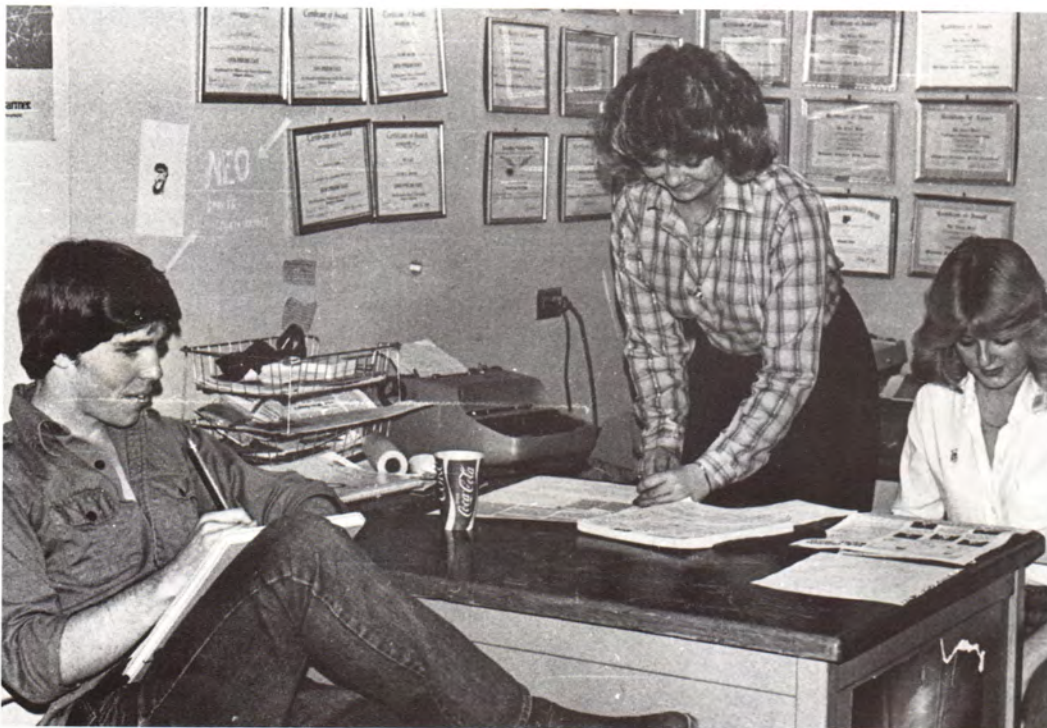

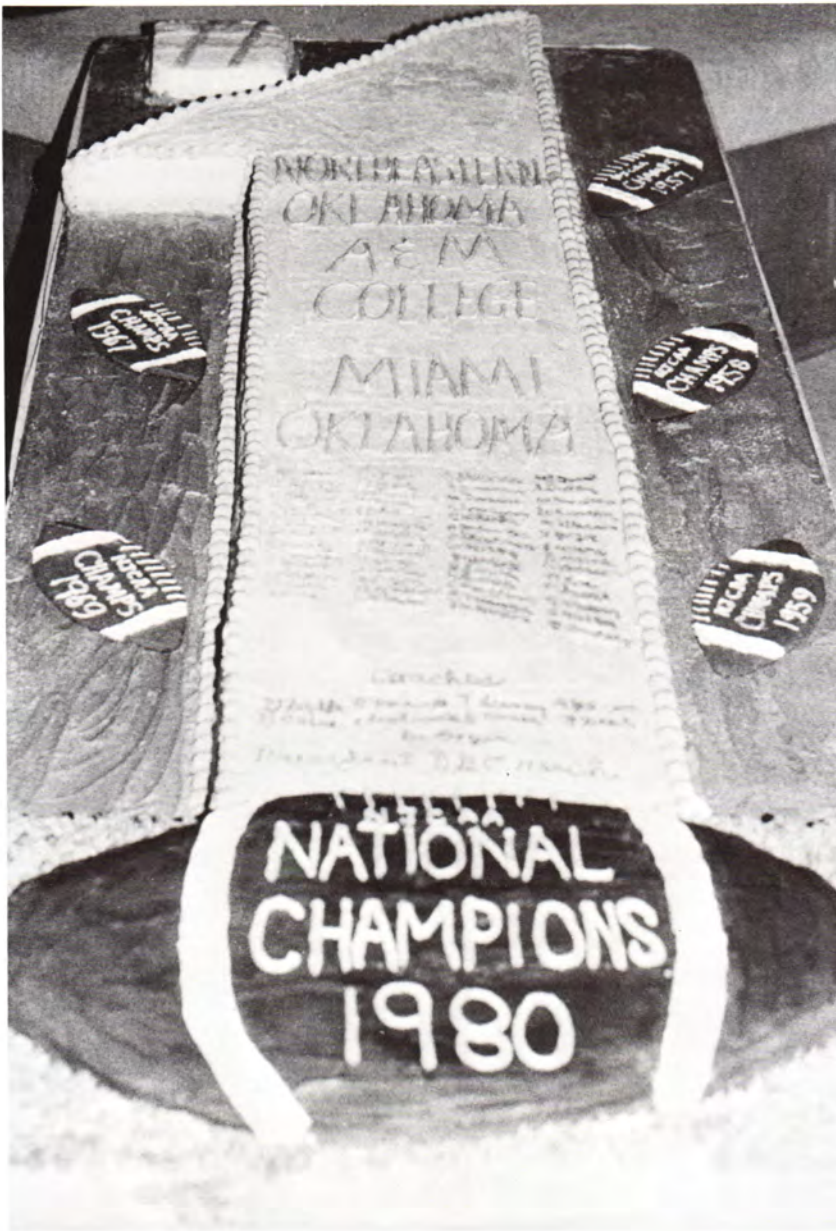

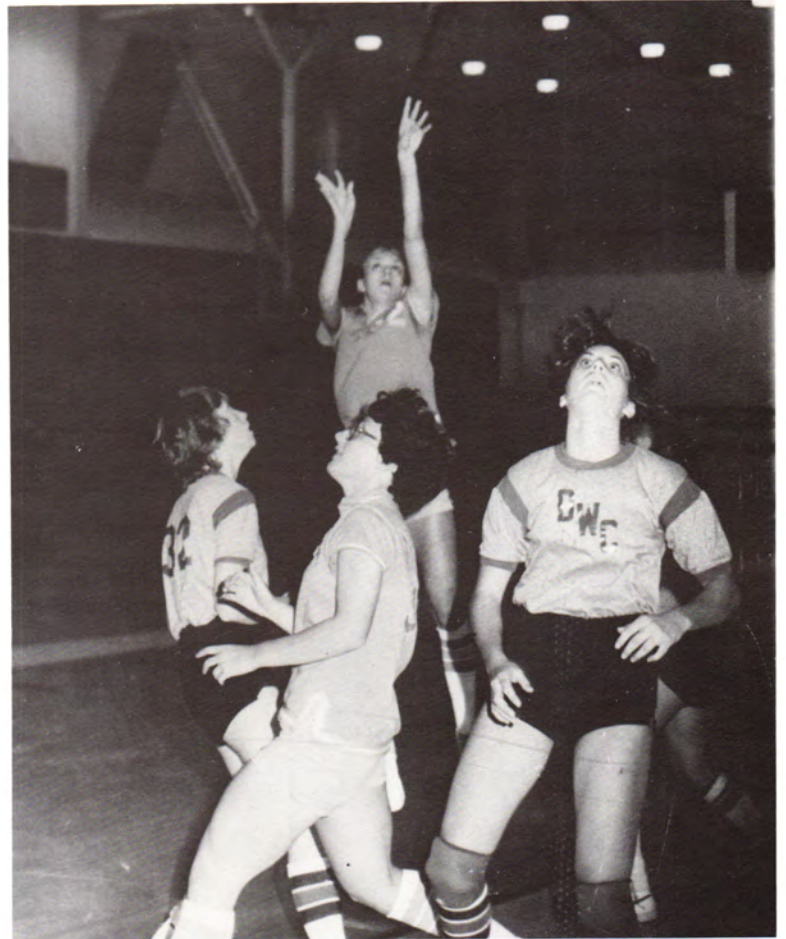

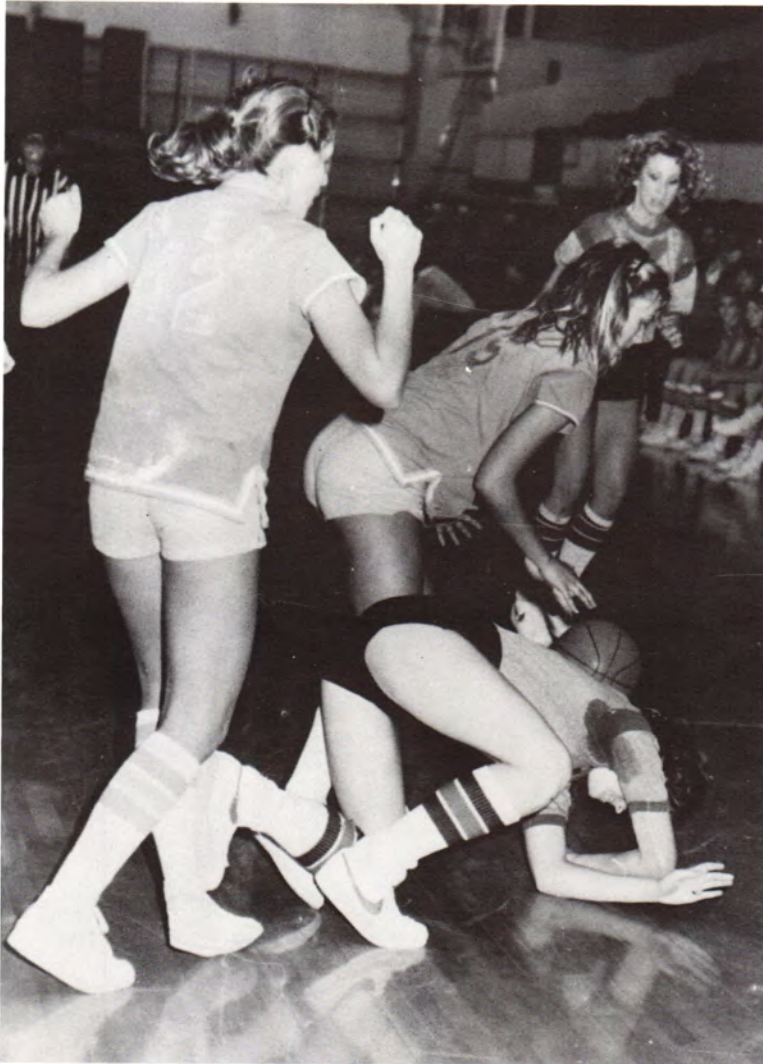

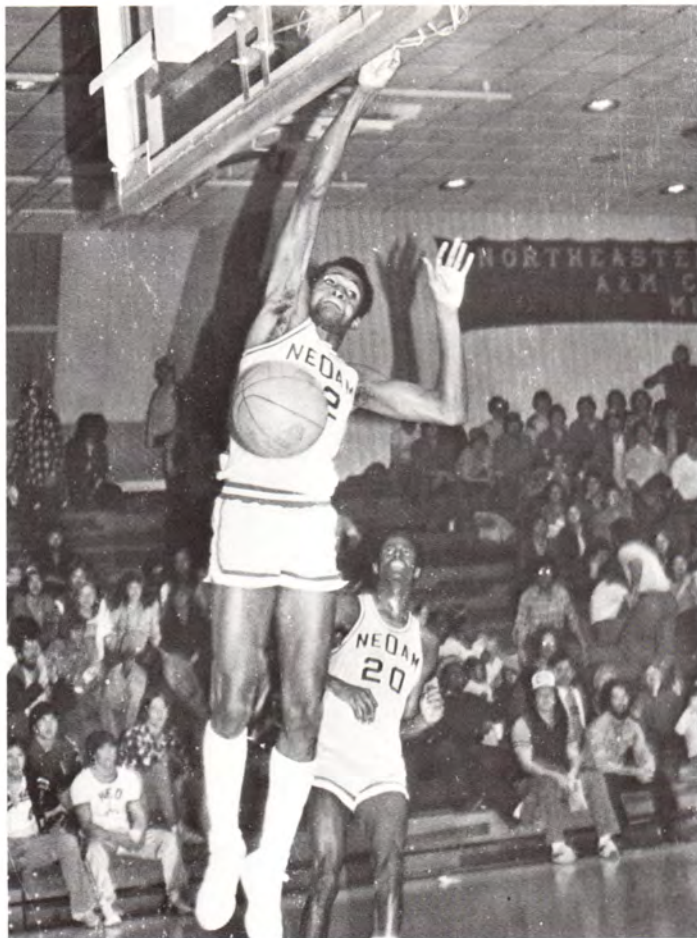

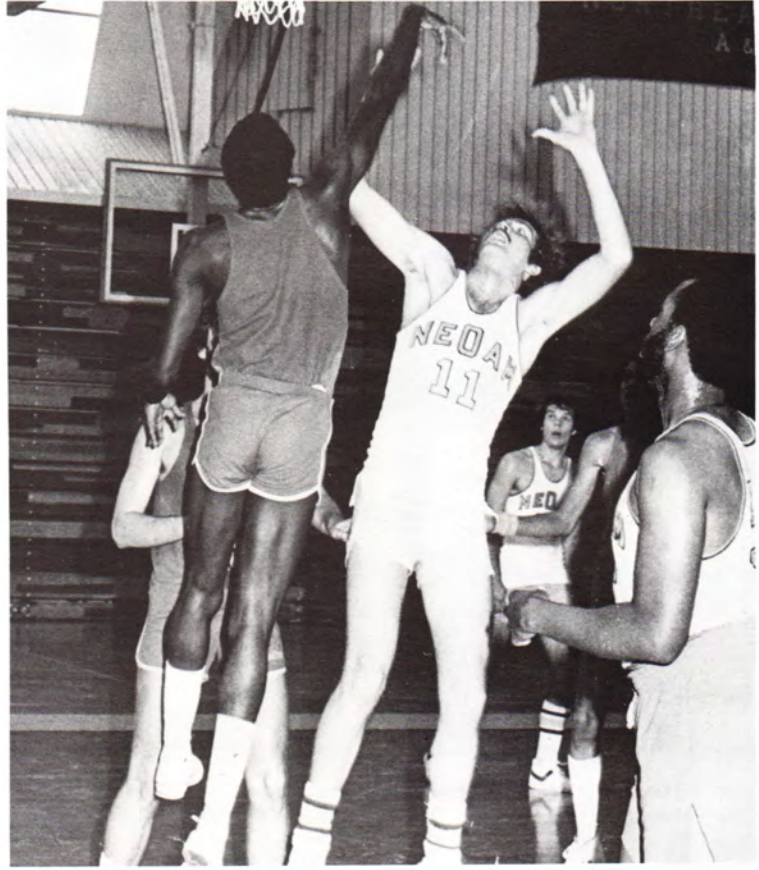

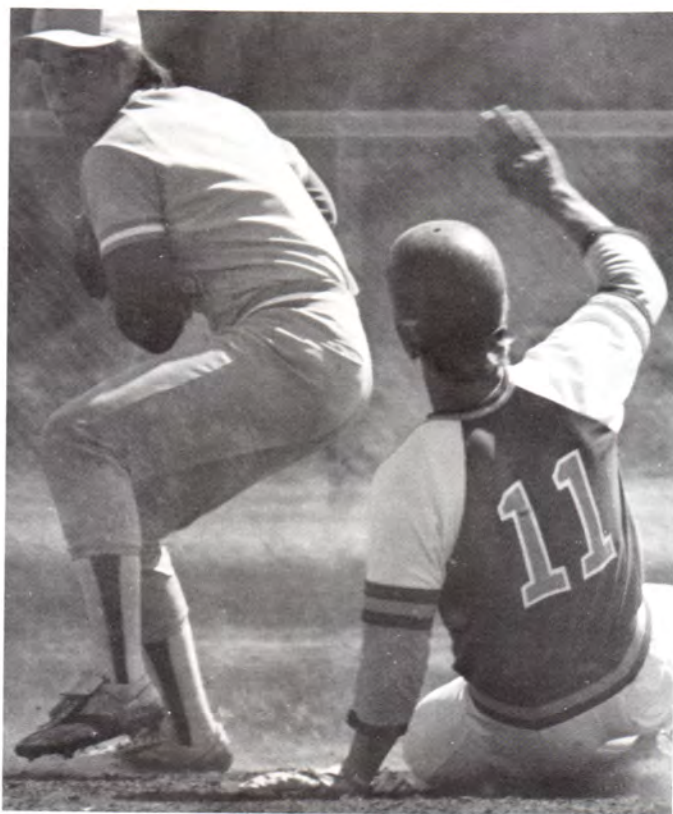

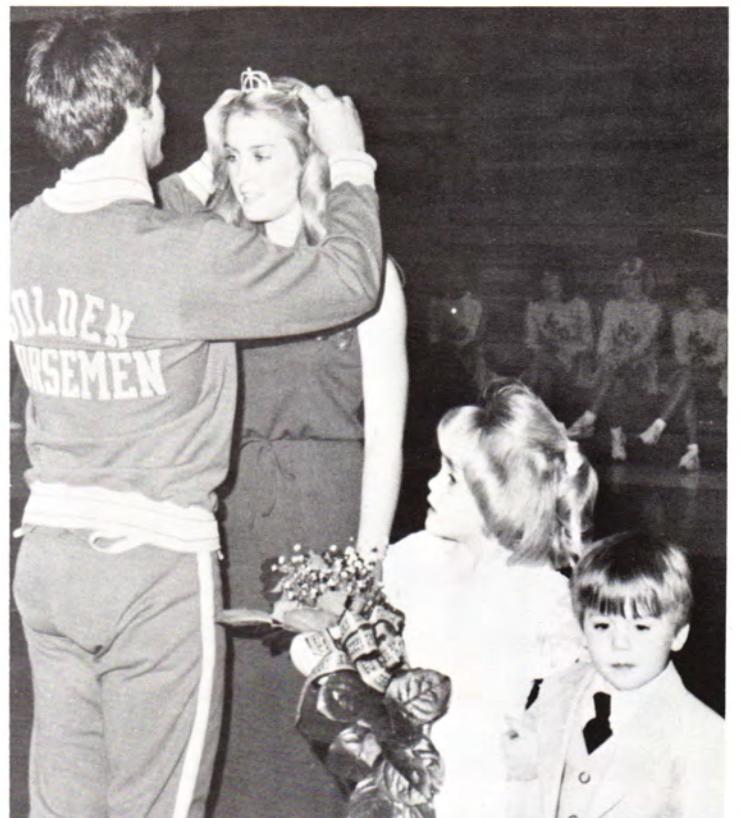

# NEO Highschool Champs Largest High School Basketball Tourney

The Northeastern Oklahoma A&M high school basketball tournament, begun in 1945 and long billed as the largest in the United States, had 11 divisions and a record 84 teams this year.

Eighty of those teams — four drew first round byes — began play with 40 games scheduled at six different gymnasiums.

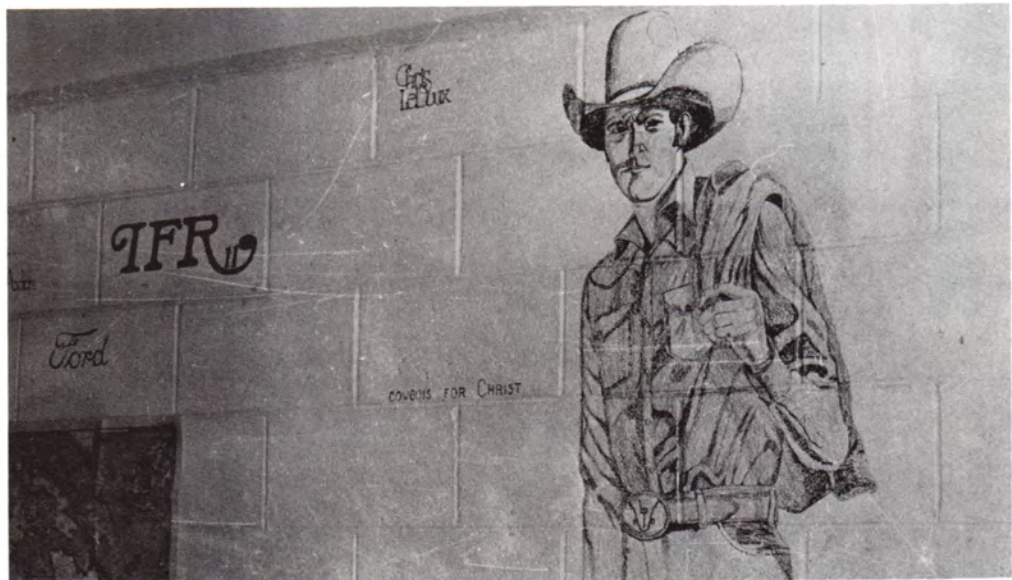

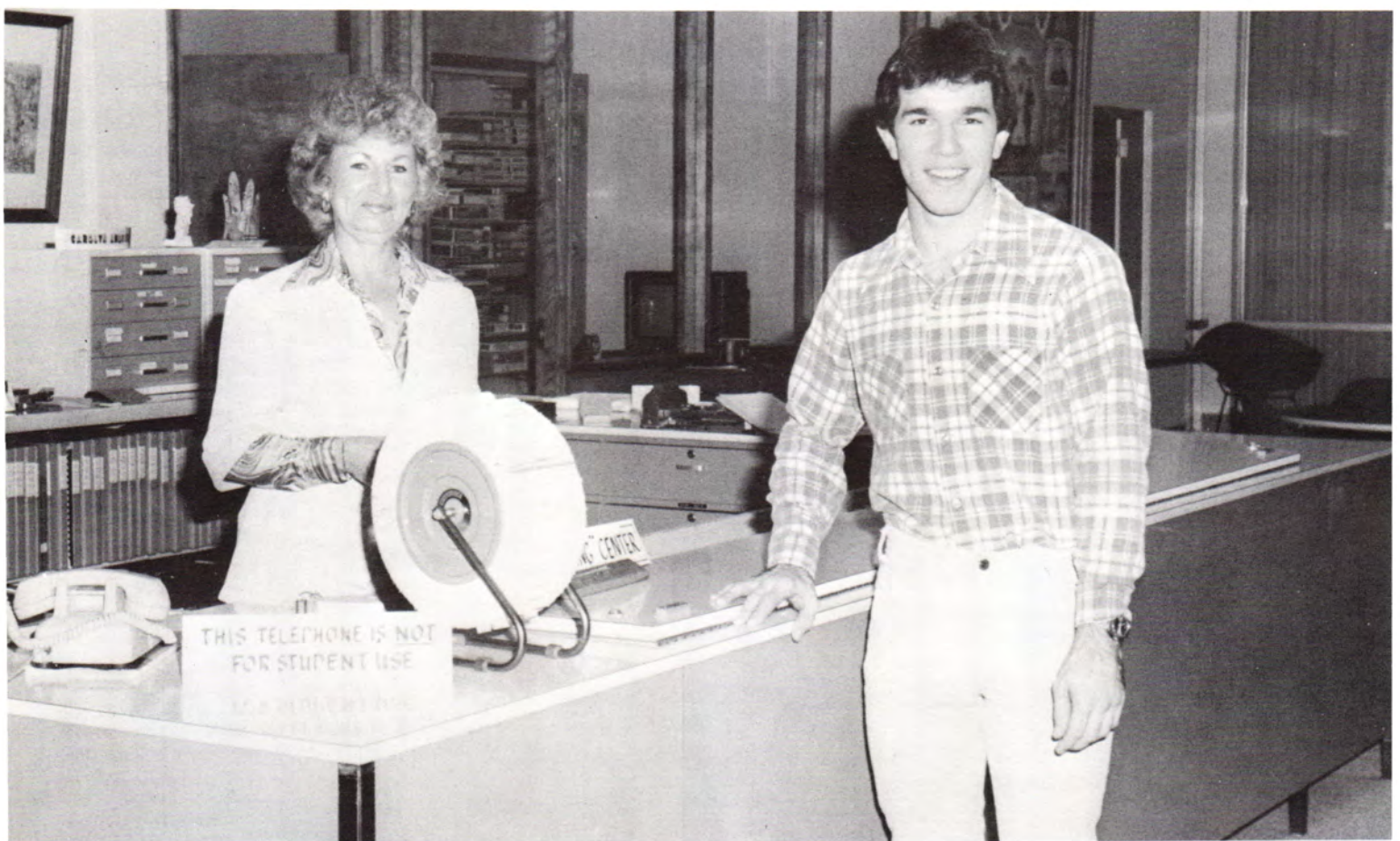

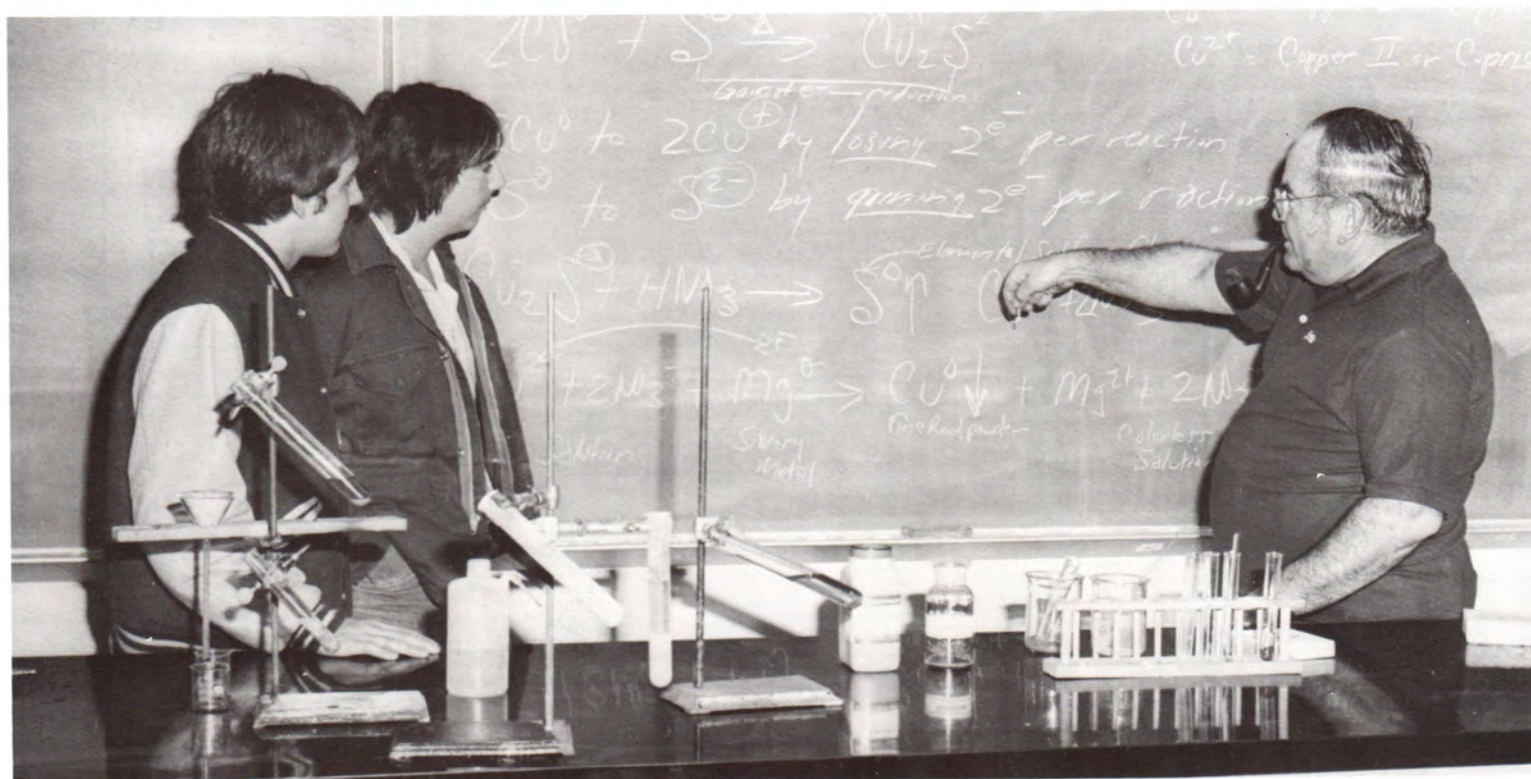

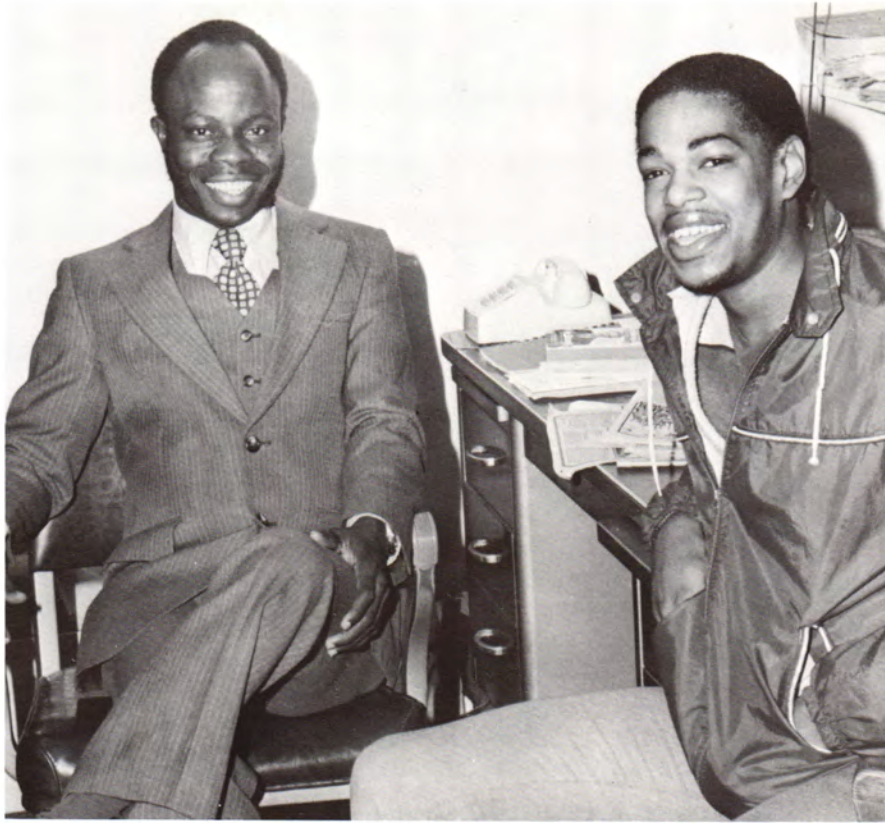

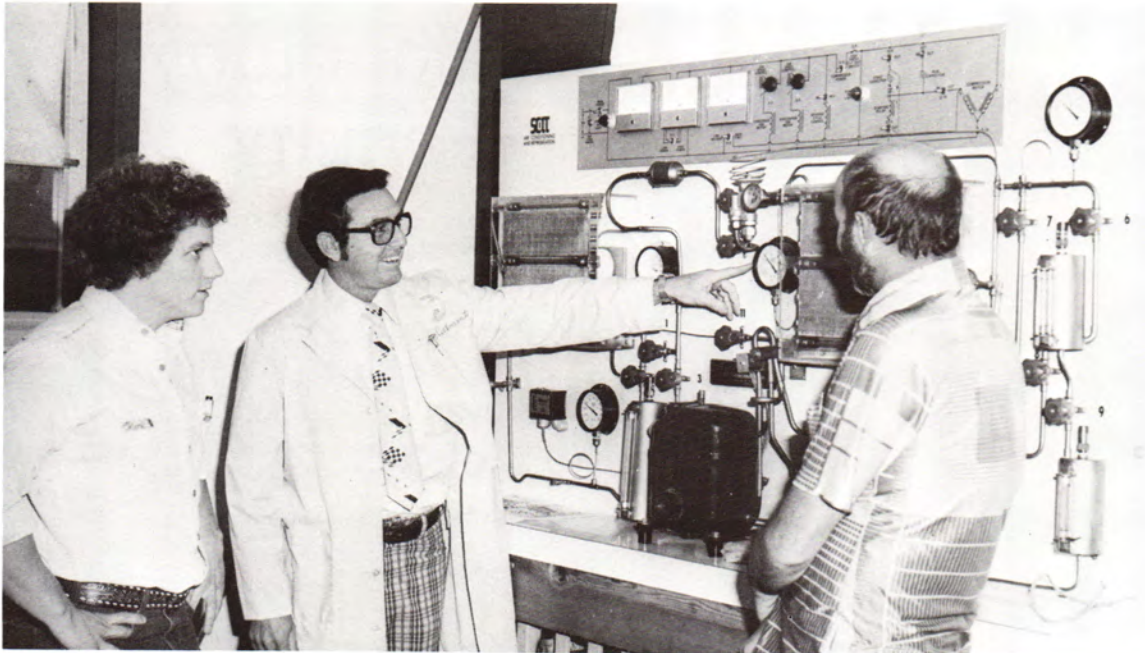

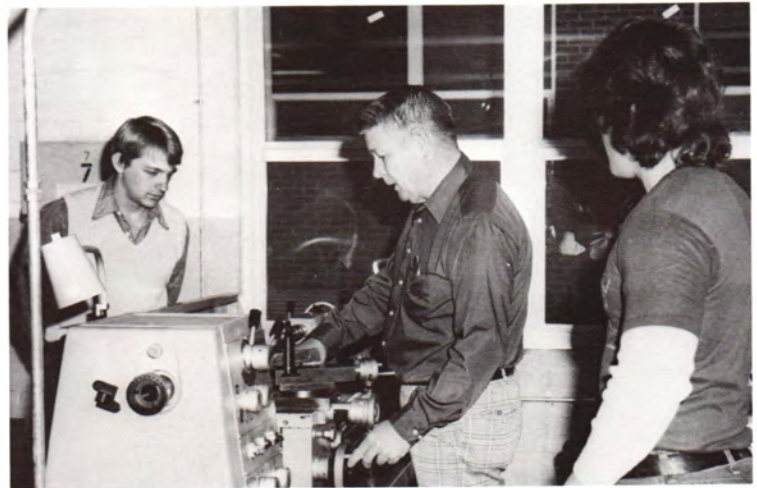

Overcoming a 14-point deficit with the aid of their passing attack, the Golden Norsemen walked away with a 21-14 win over the top ranked Kilgore (Texas) Junior College Rangers to win the National Junior College Athletic Association national championship in the Garland Chamber of Commerce Bowl in Garland, Texas, Saturday.

The Norse finish the 1980 season with a perfect 10-0 mark. The last undefeated record for the NEO gridders was in 1969 when they concluded the year with a 10-0 mark and an NJCAA championship. NEO UTILIZED THE passing combination of quarterback Tod Weder to wide receiver Duane Gunn to establish the aerial game. Weder hit 10 of 16 passes for 19 yards and one touchdown pass. Gunn caught seven of those throws for the 165 yards with his best reception being for 53 yards and a touchdown. Kilgore got on the board first on a 12-yard run by back Gary Gibbs with 2:19 left in the first quarter. The point after attempt failed leaving the score 6-0. The next Ranger score came on their next possession with an NEO punt. Kilgore marched 61 yards with tailback Gary Marshall going over the line for a score. Quarterback Steve Hanks found tight end Woodward in the end zone for the two-point conversion to make the score 14-0 with 11:13 remaining.

## Graduation at NEO

## 1981 Summer Session

The summer school schedule for the 1981 session at Northeastern Oklahoma A&M College has undergone several changes. A new schedule has been set up where each class will only meet four days, Monday through Friday, with the classes running one hour and fifteen minutes in length instead of the usual hour.

Summer school provides newly graduated high school seniors a chance to earn a few college credit hours and have an early start as college freshmen. Others take advantage of summer school to take those classes which would not fit into previous schedules. By taking hours during the summer, a college student could be able to graduate either a semester or a year earlier, than if he would have gone strictly during two-semester sessions.

Summer school covers the same material that is covered during the regular semester. The main disadvantage is that the hours are longer, and more information is covered during each class period. Homework assignments are longer and more detailed; therefore, the student needs to allow more time for out of class work.

Not only the youth take part in summer school, but also many area businessmen and career women take this opportunity to take some extra classes and catch up on some new knowledge within their field, or just to take a class in which they hold some interest in. Because of the shorter class period many find they can easily



take off a few hours every day to further their knowledge.

White.

9:40-10:55 classes are Psychology, Maynard; American History, Kramer; American Government, Largent; Philosophy, Anderson; Computer Science Orientation, Leonard, (lab - 11-11:15) Accounting, Spurling; Economics, S. Johnson; Human Relations, Keen; College Algebra, Hammons; Calculus, Prevett; Calculus, Staff; Beginning Typewriting, Weaver; Typewriting, Holland; Marriage & Family, Moffatt; Activities for Women, Calcagno; Speech (international), B. White; Study Skills, Payne; Geology, Wells (lab - 11-12:45).

Classes starting at 11:00 and going until 12:15 will be: Accounting, Spurlin; Personnel Management, Keen; Sociology, Moffatt; Psych & Adjustment, Maynard; Shorthand, Holland; American Literature, B. White; English Composition, R. Maxwell; English, (international), Rucker; Business Statistics, Johnson; Social Problems, Moffatt; Humanities, Nichols; Reading (international), Payne.

Offered as evening classes will be Basic Mathematics, Introduction to Micro-computers, Computer Science Orientation, CRT Data Entry, Shop Maintenance, Pilot's Ground School, Real Estate, Advanced First Aid, and Activities for men and women.

Second year baseball coach Mike Clark welcomed back four returning starters and a group of talented freshmen to the 1981 edition of the NEO baseball squad.

Clark roamed into the cold weather land of Iowa, Nebraska, and Kansas to recruit 11 top players and he will add them to the talented host of Oklahomans to build a regional contender.

Last season the Norsemen finished with a 30-29 overall record and a regional tournament berth, and this year Clark hopes to improve on that mark. However, a tougher schedule could hurt that goal.

"We have a good nucleus to build around and I think our freshmen players will be stronger than the people we had last season. Right now we have at least 24 solid players to build with," commented Clark.

"Our schedule will be tougher, but it should make us stronger in the long run. We will face at least three of the teams that played in the junior college World Series last year," Clark noted.

Clark has added more games to the slate so the Norse will play 60 contests this spring; however, rain-outs usually plague the campaign which will possibly cut that number down.

In order to be competitive through a long schedule, Clark feels that some added depth will help this year. "Last season we didn't have as much depth, and it hurt us, especially in the pitching department, but this year we'll have some guys who can come off the bench and play well," stated the NEO mentor.

## Final Exams Complete Year's Work

**FINAL EXAMS** — These previous words are probably the most dreaded words of any college student. They hold within their letters, frustrations, 26 hour days, sweating, broken pencils, crumpled papers, overflowing trash cans, and the ever dreadful cramming.

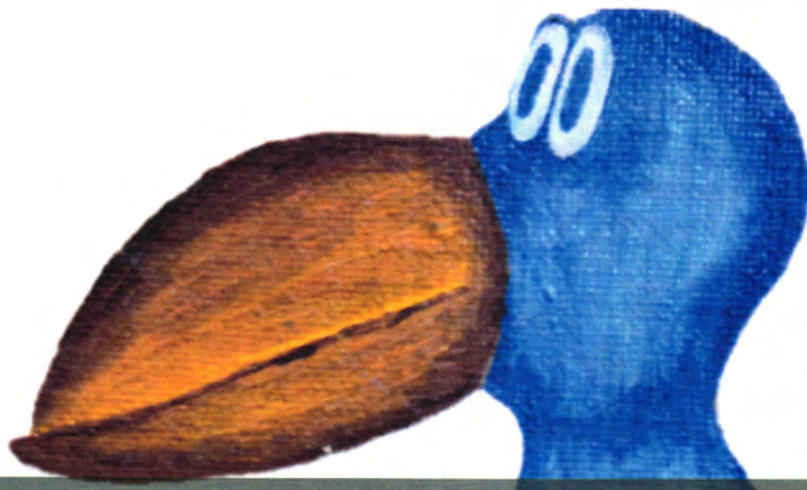
