Governor Dewey Bartlett will dedicate eight buildings on the Northeastern A&M campus, Friday, Jan. 24, Dr. Bruce G. Carter, NEO president, announced. Dedication ceremonies will be held in the new Fine Arts Center at 11 a.m.

Included in the buildings are the new \$1.5 million Fine Arts Center and fieldhouse which were completed this fall.

The other buildings, which were completed in the spring and summer 1967, include Ables Hall, vocational-technical building; Har-rill-Dobson Hall, men and women's dormitory; Library-Ad-ministration building and married students apartments.

These buildings are part of a multi-million dollar campus ex-pansion program made possible largely by the Artesian Urban Renewal project.

Upon graduation Walker in-tends to enlist in the United States Navy and complete his education in Journalism while in the service.

Instructor Shirl White Doubles As Showman

"This is the reward of many weeks of grinding rehearsals, hard work and long hours," said production director Shirl White, sitting in his director's chair reflecting over "Oklahoma" as the show opened this week on the new theatre stage of NEO's Fine Arts Center. "I am proud to have had a part in the first production to be presented in the new theatre," he said.

White is one of the more re-cent additions to the NEO faculty, joining the staff last year. Serv-ing as chairman of the com-munications division, he teaches speech and drama.

He received his Bachelor of Science Degree in speech at Northeastern State College, Tah-lequah, and Masters of Arts De-gree at the University of Tulsa. He has done further graduate work at the University of Indiana and Oklahoma State University.

Though he is new to the NEO staff, he is not new in the teach-ing profession, having taught 18 years in Tulsa schools before coming to NEO.

White took an active part in his high school and college theatre productions in preparation for his teaching career. He furthered his acting experiences in Tulsa Little Theatre and productions of Tulsa Opera.

He was assistant director of the Tulsa Doy Singers and work-ed with the Tulsa Opera chil-dren's chorus in such productions as Turinot, LaBoheme, and their annual production of Hansel and Gretel.

"Postponement of the opening date of the show was a result of trying to outguess the completion of the construction work on the new center. Even moving in only ment rehearsing on a bare stage since no sets could be built prior to this time.

"But our tech crew, headed by Carl St. Clair, set designer, Jer-old Graham and lighting director, David Froman, have worked night and day over the holidays preparing for the opening this week," he said.

"We called the cast back from vacation two days early for brush-up rehearsals but a two-week

vacation preceding opening week is most understandable but un-avoidable under these circum-stances.

"But the entire cast, orchestra, and tech crew have been a great inspiration to work with and have come through wonderfully well to make this a delightful show. The splendid cooperation between the music and speech departments has attributed to its success," White said.

The college theatre with its new facilities will provide greater op-portunities for NEO students to participate in future college pro-ductions as well as other cultur-al events brought to the campus. "Already cast and scheduled for a February opening is the drama 'All the Way Home.' To be cast in the near future will be 'The Diary of Anne Frank.' All students are encouraged to try out," he added.

Three Norse Receive Top Grid Honors

Terry Ash, Alton sophomore; Barty Chappell, Minco sophomore and Joe Horschel, sophomore from Eau Gallie, Fla., members of the 1968 Golden Norsemen football team each received honorable mention on the All-American football team for 1968.

Ash, who was the leading scorer for the Norsemen this season at tailback, and Chappell, who led the defensive unit with 62 individual tackles as a linebacker, were named to the team by the 1968 Junior College Grid Wire All-American officials in Pasadena, Calif.

Also a punt return and kick off return specialist, Ash led the Norsemen in returning 10 punts for 76 yards, and a 7.8 yard average for one touchdown. On kick-off returns, he carried the ball 12 times for 257 yards for a 21.4 average and one TD. From his tailback possession, he rushed 97 times for 310 yards and a 3.2 average. He punted 41 times this season for 1,558 yards and a 37-1 average.

Chappell was the key to the Norsemen's defense with 42 assists, broke up eight passes, intercepted one pass for a touchdown and recovered two fumbles.

Horschel, who did not miss a game his freshman year for the national champion Norsemen, missed only one game this season due to a knee injury suffered in a non-contact practice. He was named to the All-American selection given by the National Junior College Athletic Association.

Norsemen Meet Ravens Tomorrow, In New Gym

Coach Cletus Green's Golden Norsemen returned to basketball action this week after a long holiday break with two games in the new fieldhouse.

Last night, the Norsemen met the Warriors of Bacone in a Bi-State Conference clash. The Warriors won the previous meeting between these two teams at Muskogee. Tomorrow night, the Norsemen will battle with the Red Ravens of Coffeyville with the tipoff time being at 7:30 p.m.

With nearly one-third of the season gone, the Norsemen have claimed more victories through December than any other team in the history of this school. The freshman-dominated squad compiled a 9-4 record during the 1968 phase of the campaign. The record-setting Norsemen of a year ago gained eight wins for the same time and finished with a season mark of 24-9.

Wins over Crowder at Neosho, Parkland junior college of Champaign, Ill., and a victory on their home court over the Aggies of Murray have highlighted their winning ways. The Norsemen are averaging 83 points, considerably below last year's mark of 90 points a game. At press time freshman Ephraim McDaniel and Larry Brown lead the team in total points with 278 and 250 re-

spectfully. McDaniel is also the leading rebounder with a total of 156 carroms. John Hoover ranks second with 122.
