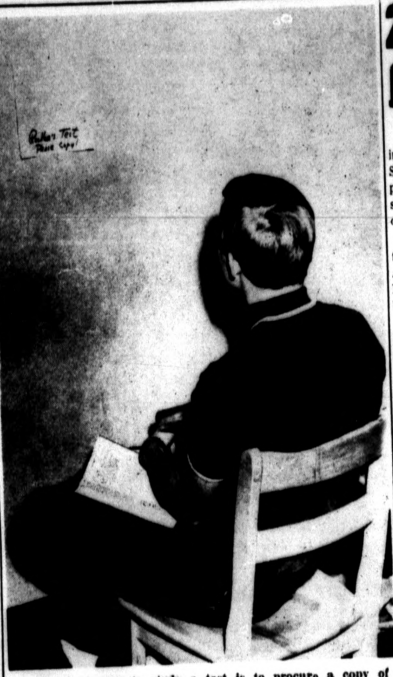

## Spring Registration Starts January 23

Sophomores will enroll Monday, Jan. 23 and Freshmen will enroll Tuesday, Jan. 24 and Wednesday, Jan. 25 for the spring semester at Northeastern A & M according to Charles Angle, Dean of Student Affairs.

As in the first semester enrollment, the time set for students to report to their advisers is determined alphabetically by the first letter of their last name. The schedule for sophomores is students with their last name beginning with a letter M-Q at 8:00-9:30, G-L from 9:30-10:30, A-F 10:30-11:30, and R-Z 11:00-12:00. Freshmen schedule is P-T 8:00-9:30, K-O at 9:30-11:00, F-J 11:00-12:00, A-E 1:00-2:00 and U-Z 2:00-3:00.

After the advisement session, students are to report to the bandroom for class sectioning. Following sectioning students may purchase books and supplies in the college bookstore.

New students who have never attended NEO are to report to Room 105 Shipley hall to have identification pictures taken on Thursday, Jan. 26. The final step

in the enrollment is the payment of fees in the business office located on the first floor of Shipley hall. Students who have not registered their cars according to campus traffic regulations should do so at the time of enrollment. Classes for the 1967 spring semester at NEO will be initiated at 8 a.m., Thursday, Jan. 26.

**Registration for Night Courses is Scheduled**

Registration for evening courses at Northeastern A&M is scheduled for Wednesday, Jan. 25, at 7 p.m. in the Carter student union.

Cost for the night classes range from \$10 for one hour courses, \$30 for two and three hour courses and \$50 for four hour courses. Full-time college students may enroll in an evening class but will have to pay the fees listed above.

Monday classes scheduled are Refrigeration 223, Humanities 223, Spanish 113, Industrial Safety 103, English 113, Speech 113, Accounting 113, Botany 114, Key Punch 112, Marriage and Family 203, Business Communication 213 and Geology 114.

Courses on Tuesday include Machine Shop 112, 123 and 133, Spanish 123, Vocational Guidance 121, Modern European History 113, Business Machines 212, Real Estate (non-credit), Social Psychology 223, Modern Mathematics 113, Electro-Mechanics Machines 105, Short-hand 113, 123 and 213 and American History 223.

Wednesday courses are Woodworking (two or three hours

credit), Economic Geography 123, Botany 114, Key Punch 112, Plane Geometry 015, High School Algebra 005, Algebra 143, Social Problems 223, Psychology 213, Basic Computer 102, Solid Geometry 153, Economics 223 and Geology 114.

On Thursday evenings the courses include Engineering Drawing 112, Descriptive Geometry 112, Federal Government 113, Woodworking, Welding, Accounting 123, Engineering Problems 112, Water Color 112, Algebra 173, Electro-Mechanics Machines 105 and Typing 113, 123 and 213.

Meeting time for the Norse band will be 1 p.m. Monday through Friday, according to Robert Swanson, director. The first semester schedule of 6 to 7 p.m. conflicted with several campus activities and classes.

Swanson said that he realized some conflicts would still exist and students enrolled in one o'clock classes on Tuesday and Thursday could make arrangements to attend band on the other three days.

## Double Overtime Loss Drops Norsemen's Bi-State Record

Spurred on by Jack Tudor's point barrage, the Bacone Warriors edged the Northeastern A&M Golden Norsemen, 120-118, in a two overtime struggle at Muskogee, Dec. 21.

The spectacular offensive display ended in a 100-100 deadlock at the conclusion of regulation play, and 112-112 after the first overtime session.

Tudor, former Tulsa Webster standout and former Tulsa World Player of the Year, headed the Warrior's attack with 41 points.

The fast-charging Bacone five vaulted into a 32-46 halftime lead, but then faltered some-

what after intermission, allowing the fired-up Norsemen to pull even.

In dropping its third encounter of the current campaign, NEO was paced by Bill Hull and Dave Lofton with 28 points apiece. Others scoring in double figures for the Norse were Ray Cooper 16, Gary Jones 14, Barney Zeigler 12, and Ron Young 11.

The Norsemen were on a hot streak entering the Bacone contest, having won five of their previous six games. The loss lowered the local's season record to 7-3, and the Norse's conference reading to 1-1.

## To NEO Cagers Westark Falls

Smarting from two straight conference losses, the Golden Norsemen placed six men in double figures as they easily downed Westark junior college of Ft. Smith, 88-75, in a ragged basketball encounter, Jan. 9, at the Miami Civic Center.

In leveling their conference mark at 2-2, and raising their overall reading to 8-4, Cletus Green's cagers charged to a comfortable 49-35 bulge at the half and were never headed.

The NEO defense limited the Ft. Smith squad to three players in double figures, with Stamp's 14 points heading the pack. Green inserted 14 different players into the game, with 11 of them entering the scorebook.

Included in the leading scorers for the Norsemen were Ron Young and Terry Johnson with 13 points apiece, Ray Cooper 12, and Barney Zeigler, Gary Jones, and Dave Lofton with 11 points each. Lofton proved more effective at the gratis stripe where he hit 5-5.

Rebounding leaders for NEO were Bill Hull with 10, Zeigler and Young with eight, and Johnson with six.

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After making a clean sweep of the football honors at Northeastern A&M, David Mann and Harold Peacock made a clean sweep of the basketball court at the Miami Civic Center during the recent NEO sponsored high school invitational basketball tournament.

### Tough Schedule Faces Cagers During Remainder of January

Stern is the assignment facing the Golden Norsemen basketballers tomorrow night as they tackle Moberly, Mo., the No. 1 ranked junior college basketball team in the nation, in Moberly.

The Norsemen ended the month of December sporting a fine 7-3 won-lost record, and have broken even in two games this month, losing to Shawnee St. Gregory's and defeating Westark junior college of Ft. Smith.

Following a short layoff for semester finals, NEO travels to Fort Smith for a return engagement with Westark, a team Miami downed 88-75 in a Jan. 9 encounter at Miami.

A Jan. 24 home contest will find the Norse hosting Iola, Kans. The locals edged the Red Devils, 75-71, early in December.

### Cavaliers Nip Napping Norse

St. Gregory's of Shawnee captured their fourth consecutive Bi-State conference decision by trampling cold-shooting Northeastern A & M, 88-73, on the Cavalier's home court, Jan. 5.

By virtue of its conquest of NEO, Shawnee remained atop the Bi-State conference standings with an unblemished 4-0 mark, tying in with an 8-1 seasonal record.

The Golden Norsemen's poor performance dipped their season's reading to 7-4, and their conference standing to a disappointing 1-2. The loss was the third in the last four games for the Norse.

With four players scoring over 14 points for the game, the smooth-working Cavaliers dominated the first half, commanding a 45-31 halftime bulge.

Although outscoring their opponents in the second half, the Norse were already too far behind to overcome the more poised Cavaliers.

Leading the NEO point producers were Bill Hull with 18, Terry Johnson 14, Ron Young 13, and Ray Cooper 10. Barney Zeigler added nine markers for the Norsemen and Johnson grabbed eight rebounds to head the Norse's board game.

Cueto and Lewis highlighted St. Gregory's attack with 26 and 18 points, respectively.

Although the Golden Norsemen canned 23 of 30 from the charity stripe, they were outshot 37-25 from the field.

## Shooting Stars Cop Seventh Game 105-77

With 14 players entering the scoring column, Cletus Green's Northeastern A & M roundballers crushed the Oral Roberts University junior varsity, 105-77, in a Dec. 15 contest at the Miami Civic Center.

The convincing rout of ORU rewarded the Norsemen their seventh victory in nine outings thus far this season. The junior varsity Titans entered the game fresh from a 97-73 romp over Poteau junior college, a game in which five Titans tallied in double figures.

Green cleared his bench during the contest, playing 16 men, with seven players responding by scoring eight or more points. All told, 14 Norsemen lit the scoreboard, displaying the depth and balance of this year's squad.

The Norse crammed in 43 field goals during the encounter, and displayed some accuracy at the free throw line, canning 19 of 26. This scoring avalanche provided NEO with a 58-32 spread at the half.

Barney Zeigler paced the Norse scoring onslaught with 16 points. Dave Lofton and Bill Hull scored 12 and 10 points, respectively. Next in line were Gary Jones, Ron Young, and Randy Silcox, all with nine points. Sparkplug guard Teas Johnson added eight points to the Norse cause.
