Tragedy struck swiftly to five Northeastern A&M students when they were killed instantly on the Will Rogers Turnpike in an automobile accident shortly after midnight Thursday, September 9.

The traffic tragedy claimed the lives of Robert Lewis Perez, sociology major, Pawnee, Okla.; Benson Dale Badgley, Keyes, Okla.; Michael Robert Ellis, technology major, Chenango Ford, New York; Michael E. Shaul, physical education major, Binghamton, New York; and Everette Max Skidgel, arts & science major, Pawnee, Okla.

The five boys, who were on the original grid squad but did not make the traveling team, had just seen NEO defeat the OMA Cadets 55-0 at Tulsa.

EDITORIALS

Each and every freshman and sophomore who enrolled at NEO was issued a traffic regulations handbook. This handbook listed in detail the college regulations and rules governing the use of motor vehicles on campus. It outlined student vehicle registration, student responsibility, fees for vehicle registration and, most important, general parking regulations.

This handbook and its regulations either went unheeded or was discarded upon possession since 82 traffic violations were issued to NEO students in the first 36 hours of actual enforcement. These tickets range from \$2 to \$5 and must be paid by the recipient before his semester grades are released.

Some of the violators blame the college for their misfortune. They say that they were not informed of the laws. These are the students who ignored the handbook. Even if the handbook was ignored, in most cases, a warning ticket was issued to improperly parked vehicles. This was, more-or-less, a slap on the hand for a wrongdoing. The real spanking came when the \$2 ticket was issued.

All through high school, students have been informed as to the responsibility they must shoulder upon entrance to college. Parking regulations to many may seem trivial, but it is included among the individual responsibilities of college life. Now is a good time to shoulder these responsibilities for tomorrow there may be a traffic ticket on your window.

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Wallace Experiences Woes of Inheritance

"We have a team that can win on any given date, and the depth to have a real good team," were the words of head football coach Jack Wallace in assessing the prospects for the 1966 Golden Norsemen.

Wallace inherited the Northeastern A&M gridiron squad when Red Robertson was sidelined by a severe heart attack just before the season-opening game with OMA. Robertson will be out for an indefinite period.

The new head coach made an impressive debut by guiding the Norse to the 55-0 conquest of O M A. The next encounter familiarized him with the woes of being head coach, however, as the NEO'ers bowed to the Apaches of Tyler, Tex., 39-12.

When asked about the team's performance against the Cadets, Wallace said, "Each boy played to the maximum of his ability. This proved to me and to each player the capability he could play each week if the desire and attitude are there."

Wallace attended high school in Afton, then followed up with his studies at NEO A&M where he played center and defensive linbacker under Robertson. He completed his college education at Kansas State, where he also displayed football abilities.

The new coach began his career at Alva, Kan., High School. After two years he moved to Pratt, Kan., where he was head football coach for four years. He then came to Miami High School as assistant football coach.

During the 1963-64 seasons, Wallace returned to NEO as assistant under Robertson. He also accompanied the 1963 Norse squad to the Junior Rose Bowl. In 1965 he returned to the Miami High School job for a year, assuming duties at NEO as assistant again this fall.

Wallace is married to the former Jo Alice Graham of Grove. They have two daughters, Karen, age 18, and Mary Ann, age 15.

Tyler Tops Norse

After an astounding season-opening conquest of O M A, Northeastern A&M succumbed to the Tyler, Tex. Apaches, 39-12, in a Sept. 17 game at Tyler.

The Norsemen were blanked until the 8:16 mark of the fourth quarter when linbacker Richard Adams climaxed a 76-yard, 10-play drive by slashing through left tackle for 5 yards and the score. Adams also added the longest gain of the drive, a 25-yard scamper.

With only 54 seconds left in the contest, Adams displayed some versatile and adept running to chalk up his second touchdown of the evening. Adams gathered in a screen pass from QB Harold Peacock, cut back to the right at midfield, eluded would-be tacklers with some very adept stepping, and then out-distanced the Apache secondary en route to a 62-yard TD romp.

Tyler scored their first touchdown with only 4:28 gone in the first stanza on a pass from freshman quarterback Louie Gavrel to split end James Becknell. Randy Ross boosted the first of his three extra points for a 7-0 Apache lead.

By scoring at the end of the first period on a 48-yard reverse play, and countering once

again just two minutes into the second quarter, the Apaches fashioned a 19-0 halftime advantage, a lead that was never threatened.

When asked about the Tyler nightmare, Coach Jack Wallace remarked, "We didn't play as well as we could have. Still, Tyler is one of the finest junior college teams I have ever seen."

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"SHUCKS, T'WEREN'T NOTHIN', FELLAS," were the most grateful words of Ron Wyrick, Miami Sophomore, when the football team dedicated the OMA game to the star halfback. Wyrick was inducted into the armed services Wednesday, Sept. 14.

Norsemen Fireworks Shoot Down Cadets

Erupting for four TD's in a four-minute span, the Golden Norsemen displayed awesome defense and crushing offense in trouncing Oklahoma Military Academy, 55-0, Sept. 8 at Tulsa Webster stadium.

After battling through a scoreless first period, the Norse hit paydirt on a 17-yard pass from Harold Peacock to Don Gramling. A three-yard plunge by Richard Sanchez followed by Wayne Cathey's second successful PAT sent NEO to the dressing room holding a 14-0 half-time edge.

The roof caved in on the Cadets as the second half started with a bang. Touching off the scoring burst was an aerial bomb from Peacock to Gramling, the play covering 79 yards.

Following the ensuing kickoff, cornerback Ron Wyrick swiped an OMA pass and returned it 40 yards for another six points. A stiff Norse defense battered the Cadets into punting and Danny Mills rambled for 22 yards to rack up the third quick score of the quarter.

On the kickoff return, OMA's Stellman was jarred by the NEO defense. Freshman Edward Scott pilfered the elusive pigskin in mid-air and galloped 24 yards to the endzone.

Scoring at this point was at such a rate the fireworks squad of Jack Rucker and John Mielke, NEO instructors, couldn't maintain a proper "display" of enthusiasm following all the scores. Later a lack of supplies forced the two to retire to the stands.

The runaway third period found Scott racing 11 yards for another TD with 4:45 remaining in the quarter. Concluding the night's scoring was Elbe Meier who sprinted 47 yards with a blocked OMA punt in the final quarter. Cathey hit on seven of eight tries for extra points.

Norse To Test Tulsa U. Frosh

Launching the home season, the Golden Norsemen entertain the Tulsa University freshman tomorrow night with kickoff at 8 p.m. at Robertson field.

This will be the first test of the season for the Golden Gales who, according to head varsity coach Glenn Dobbs of Tulsa, "have the finest freshman team in the history of the school."

Tulsa's reputation for passing attacks built around sharp-shooting quarterbacks protected by massive offensive linemen promises the fans a wide-open contest.
